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## SEASON OF LOVE

LOVE stands for "Living Our Values Everyday." I believe that this is the most important work that we do. This is not easy work, but it is what Christians are called to do. We come to church to nurture our ability to carry this out. It is in community that we develop the skills to LOVE. We gather to be nourished by God's holy word and to share the peace that Jesus Christ promises. We invite our children and our friends to experience the presence of the Holy Spirit working in our lives. We gather as a joyful community, celebrating the traditions of the past and the inevitable changes that the future will bring.

So as the leaves turn and the air gets cool, remember that a warm welcome awaits you at your church.

Our very first effort will be on Saturday, October 8th, when we will take charge of the children's activities for the Fall Festival.

On Sunday, October 9th, Reverend Pete Allen from *Simply Smiles* will be at church to discuss our mission trip to Mexico, scheduled for July 21-28, 2012.

In November we will join the other churches in northern Litchfield County at the Open Door Soup Kitchen at St. James Church in Winsted. We will be painting their dining room and hallway. This project fits with the UCC's Mission 1 initiative to fight hunger that will be underway at that time.

If you know of anyone in grades 7-12 who would like to join us, please have them give Pastor Diane a call.

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*Many kids drop out of their congregations as teenagers. Religion — or organized religion — no longer seems relevant to their lives. Their parents may want them to keep attending services, but they get so tired of arguing that they eventually give up and stop making them go. If you feel that your congregation is out of touch with young people, don't drop out. Speak up. Talk with the people who lead the youth program. Come up with ideas and offer to help. [And youth], don't expect your congregation to serve you. What can you contribute? For example, if you would like your place of worship to offer one service a month especially for young people, maybe you could help to organize it. The more involved you become, the more meaningful the service will be for you and the less likely you are to walk away.*

We'll begin **Friday, October 28th**, with the same time format as before: 7:00 breakfast followed by study and discussion from 7:30 to 8:15. The following is Dick's proposal for our first study:

Great Moments in the Unfolding Story of God's Relationship with Humankind

God is like the wind. You can't see it, but you know it's there because you can hear it and feel it and because you can see what is moved by it. God reveals him/herself to us by what God does in history by working through men and women who are called to serve God.

I propose that we focus on ten moments in the story of God's unfolding relationship with humankind (which we call the Holy Bible) that profoundly affected people's lives and indeed the history of our civilization. We will begin at the beginning and end with the Acts of the Apostles.

I hope the ten-week series will provide a valuable foundation for those who have not had a lot of experience with interpreting the treasure which we call the Holy Scriptures. For those who have spent a lot of time studying the Bible it will be an experience of returning to holy ground. But I think it will be a bit different because we will not be looking at the "great moments" in the context of a book of the Bible, but as a part of the unfolding development. Beginners are welcome, old hands are welcome, and every one in between. We learn from each other.

## STEWARDSHIP 2011 AND BEYOND

We have a new Stewardship Committee. At present the committee consists of Sue Morril, Ann Perse, Carol Magowan Janet Offensend, Mary Robertson, Bob Keiter, Jack Ritchie, Bruce McKeever, Joe Catania, Ward Belcher, and Rod Lankler. In reality, it is a committee in formation, because if you want to join and take part in our efforts, or you know of anyone who is either a member or friend of the Congregation who you think should be involved, please let us know.

We have been meeting since August and we want to share with you some of our thoughts. Essentially we are exploring ways to insure the financial stability of the Congregational Church of Salisbury, not just for now, but well into the future. We have discussed three areas to which we would like to devote our energies.

First and foremost is the upcoming Every Member Canvas, something with which you are all familiar. The Trustees are in the process of formulating a budget for the coming year--a daunting task given the shifting sands of our economy. That budget will be presented to you, for your consideration, at the annual meeting later in October. Thereafter, you will be asked to make your pledges to support the activities of the church for the coming year. We expect to celebrate our opportunity to give with our Thanksgiving, a tradition started by Pastor Steve. In the past the Herculean task of the EMC has been carried on by one person, most recently, Carol Magowan. Pastor Diane has sagely concluded that this is a big job for one person and we

have a subcommittee in formation that will include Janet Offensend, Mary Robertson, Carol Magowan and at least one more person. Needless to say, you will be hearing much from all of them in the coming weeks.

Secondly, you have all been told about the developing plans to make our church handicap accessible. Some of that is underway and more of it is in the planning stage. It is imperative that we develop a plan to finance these efforts without endangering our endowment which is so vital to deferring the operating expenses of our church. There are too many examples of failed churches because of inadequate planning. So for the first time since our anniversary in 2000, we will have a capital campaign. This is in the planning stage. You will hear more about it in the months ahead. The committee is aware that our personal resources have been and continue to be called upon in Salisbury; that these are scary times; and, that this campaign must be conducted intelligently.

Thirdly, we are developing a legacy campaign. Simply put, we hope to get us all thinking about leaving something to the church in our wills. We hope that some of you have already done this but you will soon see how easy and "painless" this can be. You might even think it fun.

Please be assured that whatever we ultimately do, it will have had prior approval of the Trustees and the Church Council. More to come.
