## Worship in the Manner of the Pilgrims

On Sunday, November 16th, the congregation will be asked to assemble on the Library lawn before the morn-



ing worship service. Each of us will be provided with a collar resembling those worn by the Pilgrims. You're encouraged to do more. (See "Want to Dress Up as a Pilgrim?" elsewhere in this issue.) As was the custom, we will be "drummed into church." The girls and women will enter first and be seated on the north side of

the Meeting House. The boys and men will then take their places on the South side. Deacons will sit in the "Amen pews," and the Minister will enter last.

No musical instruments were allowed in the early churches; the psalms will be "lined out," and the congregation will respond. We will also have a tithingman who will be prepared lest any worshippers begin to doze off. Ron Jones has accepted responsibility for delivering the sermon.

You may be glad to know that it will be a modified service. According to the customary practice the "long prayer" would have lasted for at least an hour and the sermon more than two!! In any event, if anyone has access to a large hour glass, it would be fun to have. The young people will be excused for Church School at the regular time.

#### **Taber Talk**

I am so grateful to be an American! I am so proud of the ways in which our Pilgrim faith and practice have influenced the development of our democratic institutions, beginning with the Mayflower Compact. With all its faults and shortcomings, that agreement is still a shining example of what can happen in a country where the people rule and in a place where the rights of minorities are respected.

I am encouraged by two developments:

- We will have either an African-American president or a female vice president. We are living out the implications of what the founding fathers meant when they declared that "all men are created equal!"
- And maybe it's too much to hope for, but I do hope that the message of this campaign and the congressional elections which took place two years ago is that negative campaigning does not work. The people can make decisions based on discussion of the issues.

As I write this piece I do not know whether Senator Mc-Cain or Senator Obama will win, but I do know that the new president will need our prayers. The tasks which lie ahead, especially the economic crisis, are truly daunting. Perhaps our new president will say as Abraham Lincoln said, "I get on my knees when there is nowhere else to go."



## Want to Dress Up as a Pilgrim? Try this:

Girls and women: begin with a solid-colored long dress or skirt and top, add collar and cuffs ((which can be made of felt and pinned to your costume) and an apron. Add a bonnet if you like.

Boys and men: dark pants and shirt or jacket (or vest), white cuffs and collar. The men's pants usually hit just below the knees, so you might want to hem your pants, or use Velcro or some other means of gathering and holding the pants up on the leg. Then finish the costume with white tights or socks and black shoes.

# THANKSGIVING




When you are with family and friends this holiday, let them know how thankful you are for them with this fun craft.

#### What you need:

- Photos (group or individual) of each person
- Ruler
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Envelopes
- Cardstock or construction paper
- Glue sticks

#### What you do:

- 1. Collect photos of the people you'll be seeing. For group shots, make a copy for each person.
- On the back of each picture, use a ruler and pencil to draw vertical and horizontal lines.
  Space the lines 1 inch apart to make a grid with 1-inch squares.
- 3. Starting in the top-right corner, number the squares beginning with 1. Number the top row across, then the second row and so on.
- 4. Cut out all the squares and put them in an envelope. Write the correct person's name on each envelope.
- 5. On the bottom of each piece of cardstock, write "I thank my God every time I remember you, Philippians 1:3 (NIV)." Then sign your name.
- Give each person an envelope and a piece of cardstock.
  Instruct people to put the squares in order to reveal their picture. Tell them how many numbers go across and down.
- 7. For a special keepsake, have people glue their finished photos onto the cardstock.
